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
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














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MEMOIRS of a MASSEUR By Todd Pequeen

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White or Whole Wheat

We humans have an ancient love affair with bread. Sources vary in terms of how long bread has comprised an essential part of our diet – some say 15,000 years. It's a food that does not require hunting or foraging, and with the spread of agriculture thousands of years ago, bread secured a place in our diets. Who among us does not like bread??

We eat it and we love it, but that doesn't mean we know a lot about it. Many people question the nutritional value of whole wheat bread versus white bread. What are the actual differences?

Grain Structure

A kernel of wheat has 3 layers: bran, germ, and endosperm.

The bran is the hard outer layer of the wheat kernel and is filled with fiber, B vitamins and minerals. Bran and fiber slow the process of breaking down starch into glucose, thus helping maintain steady blood sugar rather than causing spikes. Fiber helps lower cholesterol and move waste through the digestive tract. It can also help prevent the formation of small blood clots that can lead to strokes or heart attacks. Removal of the bran makes the grain easier to chew.

The germ is the nutrient-rich part of the kernel that sprouts into a new wheat plant when planted. The germ has the wheat's protein, healthy fats, vitamin E, phytochemicals, and antioxidants. Phytochemicals and essential minerals found in whole grains may help prevent some cancers. The germ is removed in refinement because of its fat content which reduces the shelf life of processed wheat products.

The endosperm is the interior layer, filled with carbohydrates, protein, and bits of B vitamins and minerals. It's easy to digest.

Whole wheat flour is made from grinding all parts of the wheat kernel into a powder.

White flour is "refined" by removing the most nutrient-rich parts of the wheat kernel, the bran and the germ, before grinding into a powder.

Refining the wheat creates fluffy flour that bakes up into light, airy breads and pastries.

Refining the wheat strips away more than half of wheat's B vitamins, 90% of vitamin E, and nearly all of the fiber.

White flour is fortified, replacing the nutrients removed in the refining process. This works for some nutrients, but many health-promoting elements of whole grains, such as phytochemicals, can't be replaced.

Nutrient Content

Whole wheat flour is higher in protein, fiber, calcium, potassium, magnesium, phosphorous, zinc, copper, manganese, selenium, and vitamin B6. It's also higher in phytochemicals, important for disease prevention.

White flour is higher in calories, carbohydrates, folate and folic acid, and iron.

Whole wheat flour has the same or more protein than most beans!

Glycemic Index

Research by the National Institutes of Health has found that the glycemic response in the body is similar in both whole wheat and white flours. However, when either flour is supplemented with about 40% chickpea flour, the glycemic index reduces.

This is critical information for those with diabetes. In terms of the glycemic index, both whole wheat and white flours perform the same in the body, according to this research.

Gluten

All wheat contains gluten. Other glutenous grains are barley, rye, malt, brewer's yeast, and all derivatives of wheat including farro. Rice, oats, guinoa, and buckwheat do not contain gluten. Those sensitive to gluten, however, should look for glutenfree oats, as oats are generally processed on the same machinery as wheat and therefore pick up some of wheat's gluten.

Gluten is very high in protein.

Gluten also causes inflammation in the body. Many diseases of inflammation go unseen – e.g., heart disease, cancers, digestive issues. Some, however, cause us regular pain. If you suffer from joint pain, removing wheat from your diet will reduce your discomfort.

Make Your Own

Bread is extremely easy to make, and in this climate, very gratifying. You won't find bread made with 40% chickpea flour in these parts, anywhere. But you can get both whole wheat and chickpea flours around town and easily make it at home. It just takes a moment.

Low GI Bread Recipe

Dissolve about 1/2 teaspoon of yeast and a teaspoon of sugar in a bit of water. Set aside. This activates the yeast. In a few minutes, foam will accrue on the top. This is necessary and means the yeast is working properly. Close and refrigerate the open yeast packet.

In a large bowl, add your desired flours in your desired combination and desired amount for however much bread you want to make. Put in a half-to-full teaspoon salt.

Add a bit of water and mix it with the flour and yeast mixtures. Add water in very small amounts and mix well until you get a dough. It should not be sticky. If the dough is sticky, add flour until it is not sticky.



Knead the dough on a floured surface for 10 minutes. This process stretches out the gluten and makes the bread chewy. (To knead: press and push the dough away from you, flattening it. Then fold the edges into the center and press and push again. Repeat for 10 minutes.)

Set aside. Cover with a damp towel or piece of plastic. In about 60-90 minutes, it will grow. Poke your fingers into it to shrink it back down, then let it rise again.

Make any shapes you want. Bake at 350F. If you put it into a cold oven, you will get a hard crust. If you put it into a preheated oven, you will get a softer crust.

Keep extra dough in the refrigerator or freezer. Enjoy!

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
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
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Welcome to That's Fishin for a brief roundup of all things Fishing here in Quepos. What a season it has been so far, a truly EPIC TUNA BITE for most of the year, some of the best Sailfishing we have seen for some years during the early part of the season and some record breaking tournaments with our Pescadora Billfish Championship (ladies only), Pelagic Rockstar and Dorado Derby tournaments reaching new heights in terms of number of boats and prize money!

OFFSHORE FISHING

The main story of the fishing over the past month has been the exceptional Tuna fishing we have experienced. July provided some red hot Tuna fishing, lots of fish in the 10-30lb class but there have been some schools running through with 50-80 pounders and then some with Wicked Tuna sized fish in them, when you see schools of 100-200lb Tuna jumping clean out of the water chasing flying fish, it is a sight to behold and you don't know whether to grab your camera or your fishing rod!



We have been seeing Sailfish on most Offshore charters but July was relatively slow in Quepos as far as Sailfish are concerned until 18th July when Capt Franklin & Alex on the BIG EYE 2 released 10 Sailfish for a fantastic day on the water, which was great to see. There has been a lot of bait out there which has brought the Tuna in close and hopefully we see a consistent Billfish bite off the back of this. AMYS DREAM caught a



stunning Black Marlin around a Tuna school mid July and there have been some Marlin showing here and there. During early July we raised 3 Blue Marlin aboard GOOD DAY in one day which was fantastic to see after a fairly slow run on the Marlin prior to that, so they are definitely out there.

The Wahoo bite has been great over the Offshore Reefs with most fish 15-30lb but some big guys also.

There have been days with plenty of small Dorados at the Offshore debris/weed lines around 8-15 miles out, with a few bigger fish mixed in. Conditions are looking great with 83 degree water temps, plenty of

evening rain and debris washing out of the rivers as a CAPT SKY & ASI O MAS have been catching some nice result. The Dorado fishing should continue to improve Roosterfish also these past few weeks. these next couple of months as the seasonal rains intensify before it peaks in November, just in time for Roosterfish can be targeted during full or half day the Dorado Derby's. inshore charters from Quepos and August will

The Offshore Marlin FADS/Seamounts have been producing Blue Marlin, Striped Marlin & Sailfish and now is an excellent time to take a multi day trip out to the FADS to target Marlin. Our recent guests went 2 for 6 on Marlin aboard the 42' TOOSEA during their 2 night/1 Day FAD trip.

Our friends in Guanacaste have been experiencing a truly epic Sailfish bite this past couple of months, as we did here in Quepos earlier in the season. It is great to see such volumes of fish in the area with boats catching double digit Sailfish on a regular basis and certainly helps give us hope for the future of our fishery.

SUMMER SLAM TOURNAMENT

The Summer Slam tournament took place on July 6th which has a super fun Species hunt format where teams set out to catch as many of the qualifying species as possible. Totally different from our highly competitive, big boat focussed Offshore Billfish tournaments, this event is wide open for all to compete and a perfect family friendly event to bring the kids along and fish the event on a small Inshore boat. Team Gollita Zapatas caught an amazing 15 different qualifying species to take the win which is a fantastic result, huge congrats to Capt. Rudy Zapata & team, well deserved! Closely followed by the Hatta Dream Ladies with Capt Roberto Gonzalez catching 11 species and the dazed Texans in third with 9 species, well done guys!

INSHORE FISHING

July produced some solid Roosterfishing when conditions were settled. Aboard GOOD DAY we caught 8 stunning Roosterfish over 2 days fishing with Roosters in the 15-30lb range. Boats IDRA,

continue to provide opportunities to catch these fine fish. This time of year is when the large Roosterfish run and catching a 50-90lb Roosterfish from Quepos is most certainly possible. Jacks, Mackerel, Snapper and more can also be caught during these Inshore trips.

Our Bottom fishing in 200-400' for Grouper, Snapper, Congrio & Tilefish can also be excellent at this time of year and well worth investing some time in. Deep dropping with Squid, Bonito or Cigar Minnow baits is very effective as is Jigging.

We have some great inshore boats available at the Marina to suit all sizes and budgets. If you would like an Inshore trip of your own just drop me or the team at the Marina Pez Vela guest centre a line.



2024 ROOSTERFISH STUDY

During late June we deployed our 3rd Satellite tag of the year into a 36" Roosterfish at the Naranjo rocks area, just south of Quepos. Amazingly just 10 days later we recaptured the same fish in the same location, aboard the same boat GOOD DAY, what are the chances!? The Tag was still intact and the fish was very healthy so we released it with the Sat Tag still intact. We are looking forward to seeing where the Roosterfish travels over the coming 3 months until the Tag pops off. We are also awaiting the results of a further Roosterfish that we tagged in February with a 5 month Sat Tag applied. This was a larger Roosterfish in the 40-45lb range and we deployed the Tag for 5 months instead of the usual 3 month timeframe that we set the Sat Tags to.

We will share full results of the data once we receive it. From previous tags we have deployed we are generally seeing a northern migration of the Roosterfish that we Tag in the Quepos/Dominical areas. Most of them head up to the Nicoya Peninsula area, we assume following the current that way and several tags have popped off in the area close to San Lucas Island in the mouth of the Nicoya Peninsula. Two Tagged Roosterfish last year headed 60-80 miles Offshore way over the continental shelf, behaviour we had not evidenced before. We still have many unanswered questions such as when/if the Roosters travel back south. We deployed a Sat Tag in Drake Bay earlier this year to spread our reach of Sat Tags further but unfortunately we did not get any data on that particular tag. It is a long and costly process but we are committed and have a great team. Huge thanks to MARINA PEZ VELA, GRAY FISHTAG RESEARCH and all of our sponsors for their dedication with our ongoing ROOSTERFISH STUDY as we continue to learn more each year about the migration patterns of this iconic fish.

TOURNAMENT DATES

We are just 3 months away from our first tournaments of the coming season, the Dorado Derby 1 & 2 taking place on 9th & 16th November. Certainly one of our top tournaments of the year and a firm favourite with Quepenos! Team entries are coming in and boats are getting booked up. If you would like to fish this event please get you boat reserved ASAP as boats will almost certainly sell out for this event.

Team SKY & Team TRIP will be looking to defend their crowns from last years events. I have guests coming in from Ireland and New Jersey to fish the event as well as TEAM PEYTONS PIRATES representing the Costa Ballena area, who just love fishing this event.



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




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Soy Marinated Eggs

Japanese Ramen eggs, or Korean "drug eggs," are the guintessential umami topping for noodle soups or steamed rice. Here are a few tips to make those perfectly jammy yolks.



Ingredients

- 6 eggs
- 1 teaspoon of salt or white vinegar
- Ice bath for eggs

For the marinade

- 3/4 cups of Mirin
- 1/4 cup of regular soy sauce ٠
- 1/4 cup of dark soy sauce
- 1/2 cup of water
- 2 teaspoons of brown sugar •
- 1 splash of Sake (optional)



Optional additions

- 1 clove of minced garlic
- Freshly chopped hot peppers
- Finely sliced chives
- Toasted sesame seeds*
- Sesame oil*

Directions

- 1. Bring the marinade ingredients to boil for a couple minutes and then cool down.
- 2. In a deep pot, bring 1 liter of water to a boil.
- 3. Add salt or vinegar to prevent leakage.
- 4. Carefully place eggs into the boiling pan, and set the timer for 7 minutes.
- 5. Gently stir eggs after one minute so yolks will rest in the middle.
- 6. After 7 minutes, plunge eggs into the ice bath to stop the cooking and hasten the cooling.
- 7. Peel and cover with the cooled marinade (a small ziploc bag works well).
- 8. Store in refrigerator, serve after at least 4 hours, or better yet the next day.



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
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Dive Deep, Dive Green: Eco-Friendly Practices for Water and Scuba **Enthusiasts in Costa Rica**



Whilst all of us may not be scuba divers yet, it may be something you are thinking about. Maybe not, maybe you just love the water. Whoever you are and however much you enjoy the water. Costa Rica is certainly a place to enjoy the ocean. But whilst doing that, it is important to engage in eco friendly practices. Here in Costa Rica we have a beautiful underwater paradise that is waiting to be explored. Cln this article, we explore how divers and water enthusiasts can enjoy the beauty of Costa Rica's oceans while contributing to their conservation.



The Importance of Eco-Friendly Diving

If you are a scuba diver, Eco-friendly diving is essential for maintaining the health of marine ecosystems. The delicate balance of oceanic life can be easily disrupted by careless human activities. Eco-friendly practices not only minimize negative impacts but also promote the regeneration and sustainability of marine environments. In Costa Rica, where marine biodiversity is a significant draw for tourists, adopting green diving practices is crucial.

Eco-Friendly in-water Practices

Buoyancy Control: Mastering buoyancy is vital for protecting marine habitats, and not just for scuba divers underwater. Proper buoyancy control prevents you from unintentionally touching or damaging corals and other sensitive structures. As a snorkeler or swimmer this could be floating with a good distance from reefs and not walking or stepping on reefs and rocks in the ocean. This skill can be developed through training and practice, ensuring that you as divers and snorkelers can hover effortlessly above the seabed.

Marine Life Interaction: Respecting marine life is a cornerstone of eco-friendly interactions. Avoid touching or chasing marine creatures, and maintain a safe distance to prevent stress or harm. Remember, your presence should be non-intrusive and leave no trace. Extremely important as well, do not feed marine life. The same rules apply in the ocean as they do on land. Feeding fish, pineapple, water melon or whatever you have onboard is not part of their natural diet so please refrain from doing so.

Use Reef-Safe Sunscreen: Many sunscreens contain chemicals harmful to marine life, particularly coral reefs. Opt for reef-safe sunscreens that do not contain oxybenzone or octinoxate. These products protect your skin without compromising the health of the ocean.

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
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What to do if you're caught in a Rip Current

DON'T PANIC! Swim Parallel to the shore until clear of the current. If you can't break free, let the current take you out beyond the breakers. Then swim diagonally toward the shore. Never try to swim against the current. Remember it's easier to float in salt water.

The First Time I Had Something Stolen in Costa Rica

Sadly, this is a three part series since I've been robbed more than once. This was the first time, over 20 years ago, when there were a lot less tourists visiting Costa Rica. I had already been on a few surf trips around the country, but this was one of my first times on the Guanacaste coast. I hope this series offers a reminder to others, that even if you think your things are safe it is important to always be vigilant with your belongings.




So back in 1999, before digital cameras arrived, I loved taking surfing photos. I had a Nikon 35mm camera with a decent 500mm lens for getting up close to the surf action. In Dominical I would take photos of local and visiting surfers, then take the bus over the mountain to San Isidro to get the rolls of films developed, and then take the bus again to pick up the finished prints, hoping they were not too blurry or dark or out of center to share.

My friends Tommy and Russ were visiting from Florida and we headed up to Playa Negra, a powerful hollow right wave that breaks on a rock reef shelf. At low tide I was able to walk out over the shelf and take some unreal photos of my friends getting barrelled in the dark blue cylinders that formed 100 meters away. They paddled in and got a few of me as well. We were so stoked.

The next morning at dawn we left our hotel in Tamarindo and headed down to Avellanas. We were the only ones in the parking lot and we walked with our boards and my camera down the beach north to the rivermouth, just across from where Hacienda Pinilla starts now. We had heard not to leave anything in the car so we left it empty.

The waves at the rivermouth were amazing, 1-2 feet overhead on the sets, milky glass conditions and not another person around. I took some shots for about 30 minutes and by then was dying to paddle out and catch a few myself. I looked up and down the beach and didn't see another soul. I thought no one could sneak up on the wide sandy section where I was standing to take my gear without one of us seeing them.



So I set the camera back in its nondescript bag and pushed the bag against a large log that had washed up from an earlier swell. The sun was just peeking over the trees as I walked into the shore break with my board, anxious to paddle out. It took about 5 minutes to get to the peak, and when I turned back to the beach it appeared the bag was still there.

I caught one wave, did a couple of carves and finished with a floater, diving off the board to avoid the shallow sandbar. I looked toward the beach again, and at that moment I saw a man standing over the log with my camera bag in his hands. I shouted to my friends that I was getting robbed and jumped on my board to belly surf to the sand.

I left the board there, somehow running towards the log and removing my leash at the time. I was sprinting to catch up to the guy who had a head start towards the mangroves behind the hotel



Cabinas Las Olas. I remember crawling over fallen logs, jumping over grass and mud, thinking the thief was just ahead of me as I could hear the rustling and breaking tree limbs as he crashed through them.


After 10 minutes of running barefoot I lost him but kept plodding forward with my eyes on the ground,

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hoping that maybe he dropped the rolls of film and only wanted the camera. Eventually I reached the hotel grounds and searched all over the property hoping to find the thief or anything that was in the camera bag. I came up empty and both feet were bleeding from the rough terrain.


My friends brought my board back to the car and we drove around for another hour, wondering how he was able to stalk us, get to the bag, and then escape without getting caught. We checked around the nearby village to see if anyone was trying to sell a camera. And we went back to surf the same spot the next day so I could retrace my steps of the chase, hoping again that the thief dropped something.

I will always remember how good the waves were that trip, but not having those photos hurts to this day. The lesson I learned is - Never leave your valuables unattended on the beach - even something as trivial as a pair of flip flops. Someone is bound to be watching you and waiting for the right moment to steal it. For things like keys or a phone, if there is no place to hide them really well and you have to leave them on the beach, put them in an old plastic snack bag and dig multiple holes, and then bury them in one of the holes. Or find an old coconut husk and hide your keys in there, setting it back among other beach debris above the high tide line. At least that way the thief will need more time to find your stuff.

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IN NATURE TABLE MANNERS AREN'T PART OF EATING **By Jack Ewing**

My sister and brother-in-law, live in northern Minnesota where they own and manage a nature reserve called Wolf Song. When they bought the land there weren't any wolves. Now, after 40 years of rewilding, there are plenty. Recently, among other new species, they have been seeing lots of black bears. Not long ago Alan sent me a beautiful photo of a big, healthy, adult bear walking directly toward the trail camera. A couple of weeks later he sent me a video of a lame bear that probably had at least one broken leg. It could have been the same bear, but there is no way of knowing. They suspect it had been hit by a car on one of the local roads. A bear with a broken leg can't catch any prey or wander very far to gather berries and other types of food. It has a minimal diet and will eventually starve.



One day I received a message from my sister saying they thought the bear had died because about a dozen vultures were circling near their house. I responded right away telling her that the vultures wouldn't wait for the bear to die. As long as it was down and couldn't harm them, they would start eating it bite by bite. First, they would pluck its eyes out and then go for the soft parts of its body. They didn't care that it was still alive. It was food, and that's all that counted. Alan tried to find the bear with the mission of shooting it and putting it out of its misery before the vultures got to work on it, but he couldn't find it, and the next day the vultures were nowhere to be seen. No one knows what happened to the bear.

Vultures aren't the only carnivores or omnivores that will start eating another animal that is dying but not yet dead. Some of the workers at Hacienda Barú once watched a group of white-fronted capuchin monkeys attack a big, fat, female, green iguana, rip her open with their claws, scoop the slimy mass of shell-less eggs out of her womb, and slurp them down as fast as possible, each monkey struggling to get a bigger share. When there were no more eggs to be had they tore her apart and ate her piece by piece even though she was twitching and struggling, obviously, still alive. Eventually, she died. Like the vultures, food is food. Eat it while you have it. Waiting around for it to die is not an option.

One of our guides captured a photo of a monkey eating a young iguana without bothering to kill it first. Spiny-tailed iguanas also catch and eat baby green iguanas, and, like the monkeys, they don't wait around for the prey to die before commencing the feast. Bite, chew, and swallow is all there is to it. Kill is not part of the procedure.

Other species do things differently, they kill before they eat, sometimes. In my latest book Monkeys Are Made of Mangos, one chapter tells the story of a female puma that tortured a Yapok, (sometimes called a Water Opossum), for 30 minutes before it walked out of the field of view of the trail camera that was filming the loathsome event. The puma reminded me of a domestic cat "playing" with a mouse but stopping short of killing it. The yapok kept trying to return to a nearby stream and the puma would pick it up by the back of the neck, carry it a couple of meters from the water, bat it around with her huge paws, allow it to drag its battered body back to the stream and repeat the process. I don't know if she ever killed or ate the yapok.



Pumas are known to kill their prey with a bonecrunching bite to the back of the neck. I suspect it uses this procedure on prey animals that are too large to torment as it did with the yapok.

Of the Costa Rican felines, the puma is second only to the jaguar in size, but it will be wary of attacking a smaller animal that is capable of meting out a severe wound. Coatis are much smaller than pumas and are often preyed on by them. Nevertheless, if a puma attacks a coati and doesn't surprise and kill it with one bite, the puma could receive a nasty wound before it finishes killing the coati. Coati bites and scratches and are often deep and susceptible to infection. Coatis have a knack for latching onto a patch of skin and ripping it off. A badly infected wound could bring death to the wounded animal. Wild animals can't just run down to the emergency room for a shot of antibiotics.

Screwworms look like maggots, but there is a big difference. I remember my 5th grade science teacher had been a medic in the Second World War. One day he explained to us that at their field hospitals antibiotics were not available to treat infected wounds. As an alternative, they would allow blow flies to lay their eggs on the wound. The fly eggs hatched into short, fat, white, little worms called maggots. The maggots ate all of the dead flesh, but they didn't touch the living tissue. Then the medics applied an antiseptic, such as tincture of iodine, which killed the maggots and prevented further infection.

As I mentioned, screwworms look like maggots. They also come from fly eggs, but a different species of flies. The big difference is that screwworms eat living flesh. If a cow, for example, cuts herself on a barbed wire fence; it is likely that a few screwworms will soon appear and eat away at the cut, causing it to get bigger and bigger with more and fatter screwworms. Cattlemen know that it is important to apply an antiparasitic liquid that will kill them. This must be done daily until the wound closes. Most use a product that kills the screwworms and, at the same time, promotes healing of the wound. If a wild animal has a wound that becomes infested with screwworms it has no way of eliminating them. The screwworms will keep eating until the animal dies. It will likely die from infection before the screwworms eat it to death. What a horrible way to die.



And I thought Mother Nature was supposed to be nice. Nice is a human sentiment. Mother Nature doesn't judge the difference between nice and nasty. She knows that food is essential, but table manners aren't.

Jack Ewing was born and educated in Colorado. In 1970 he and his wife Diane moved to the jungles of Costa Rica where they raised two children, Natalie and Chris. The Great Blue Heron (Ardea herodias) is a large wading bird in the heron family Ardeidae, common near the shores of open water and in wetlands over most of North and Central America, as well as far northwestern South America, the Caribbean and the Galapagos Islands.



Notable features of great blue herons include slaty (gray with a slight azure blue) flight feathers, red-brown thighs, and a paired redbrown and black stripe up the flanks; the neck is rustygray, with black and white streaking down the front; the head is paler, with a nearly white face, and a pair of black or slate plumes runs from just above the eye to the back of the head. The feathers on the lower neck are long and plume-like: it also has plumes on

The bill is dull yellowish, becoming orange briefly at the start of the breeding season, and the lower legs are gray, also becoming orangey at the start of the breeding season. Immature birds are duller in color, with a dull blackish-gray crown, and the flank pattern is only weakly defined; they have no plumes, and the bill is dull gray-yellow.

As large wading birds, great blue herons are capable of feeding in deeper waters, thus are able the lower back at the start of the breeding season. to harvest from niche areas not open to most other heron species. Typically, the great blue heron feeds in shallow waters, usually less than 50 cm (20 in) deep,[20] or at the water's edge during both the night and the day, but especially around dawn and dusk. The most commonly employed hunting technique of the species is wading slowly with its long legs through shallow water and quickly spearing fish or frogs with its long, sharp bill. The great blue heron can adapt to almost any wetland Although usually ponderous in movements, the habitat in its range. It may be found in numbers in great blue heron is adaptable in its fishing methods. fresh and saltwater marshes, mangroveswamps, Feeding behaviors variably have consisted of flooded meadows, lake edges, or shorelines. It is quite standing in one place, probing, pecking, walking at adaptable and may be seen in heavily developed areas slow speeds, moving quickly, flying short distances as long as they hold bodies of fish-bearing water. and alighting, hovering over the water and picking Great blue herons rarely venture far from bodies of up prey, diving headfirst into the water, alighting on water, but are occasionally seen flying over upland water feet-first, jumping from perches feet-first, and areas. They usually nest in trees or bushes near swimming or floating on the surface of the water. water's edge, often on islands (which minimizes the potential for predation) or partially isolated spots.

This species usually breeds in colonies, in trees close to lakes or other wetlands. Although nests are often reused for many years and herons are socially monogamous within a single breeding season, individuals usually choose new mates each year.Males arrive at colonies first and settle on nests, where they court females; most males choose a different nest each year. Great blue herons build a bulky stick nest. Nests are usually around 50 cm (20 in) across when first constructed, but can grow to more than 120 cm (47 in) in width and 90 cm (35 in) deep with repeated use and additional construction.







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Please do not feed or interact with the wildlife... it is the law!

Did you know that Costa Rica has a great wealth of nature, with about 5% of the species worldwide concentrated in our small country? We have over 8,500 species of plants, 220 species of reptiles, 160 species of amphibians, 205 species of mammals, and 850 species birds. However, deforestation, poaching, the use of pesticides, illegal pet trade, and improper feeding have caused a decline in populations of many species to levels that threaten their survival.

You might find feeding and interacting with the wild animals to be a thrilling experience, but you are not doing the them a favor. In fact, you are actually harming them, and it is against the law (Conservation of Wildlife Act No. 7317 according to Decree No. 32633- MINAE). The only exception is a dire emergency where a species would perish without aid or food.



Here's why you should not feed our wildlife:

• Wildlife are highly susceptible to diseases from human hands. They can die from bacteria transferred off your hand that has no ill effect on you. They can pass diseases to you as well.

- Migration to human-populated areas to be fed increases the risk of dog attacks, road accidents, and electrocution
- Irregular feeding leads to an aggressive behavior toward humans and other species and creates a dangerous dependency on humans that diminishes the wildlife survival abilities.
- Contrary to the stereotype, bananas are not the preferred food of monkeys in the wild, nor other wildlife in the area. Tropical fruits, seeds, eggs, and insects found in the wild are what nature intended. Bananas, especially those containing pesticides, can upset their delicate digestive systems and cause serious dental problems that can lead to eventual death.
- Pregnant females who are fed nothing but bananas during their pregnancy will not give birth to healthy infants. The babies will be malnourished, or even die before birth.
- Feeding interferes with their natural habits and upsets the balance of their lifestyle.
- Contact with humans facilitates poaching and the trade in illegal wildlife.
- Wildlife needs to travel long distances each day to be in good physical condition. If they know that food is available in a particular location, they will not leave that area.

In addition, pursuing or getting close to animals for pictures or touching is very stressful to the animal. Sloths may look like they are always smiling, but close human contact causes them to become agitated, so keep your distance!

The wildlife does not realize any of this. Now YOU DO, so you are no longer naïve to the harm caused by feeding and interaction. Don't facilitate the extinction of nature's most amazing creatures for your own pleasure or financial gain.










Smith family at KSTR

There are vacation rental properties, and there are great vacation rental properties. Make yours stand out from the crowd.




Owning a great rental property can make you stand out from the competition and will ensure that your

FURNITURE

Choosing your furniture carefully will give you better returns on your investment in the long run. Do your homework—and set a realistic budget! The rule of thumb when buying furniture is to buy the best quality you can afford, even for a rental property. will not be happy, and unhappy renters give bad reviews! At the store, I have had many conversations with renters who have had bad experiences like this because there is nowhere for them to relax in comfort—and it's their vacation! Cheap sofas can become uncomfortable quickly and start to look shabby. Better quality sofas will have superior construction and use durable fabrics that are easy to clean.

Remember that you do not need to over-furnish. Make a list of the essentials and as long as renters have the basics and some decent storage you will be okay. Give them somewhere to put away their luggage, their clothes, and their other personal stuff as a minimum. If you have a wall mounted TV, add a table below to hold remotes and other accessories, and a place near the entry where keys, change and other bits and pieces can be placed and easily located when needed.



Back home we are used to having indoor dining, but remember that here we live outdoors. Get an outdoor dining set that will accommodate at least as many people as you can sleep in your rental. Consider selecting multi-purpose furniture when possible. Comfortable outdoor dining chairs are useful in providing some casual outdoor seating when needed, and don't forget the pool loungers. People need somewhere to sit when they come from the pool, so encourage them away from the upholstered pieces and give them some comfortable seating where they can dry off without ruining a chair or sofa!

WINDOW COVERING

Living down here, we may not worry so much about privacy at the windows unless there is another house close by-but you know that the vacationers will. They

are used to pulling blinds or curtains at home, so area and master bedroom, they will add an element of reduce possible stress and help them feel comfortable prestige to your promotional photos. by adding ready-made panels or custom shades to at least the bedroom windows. Twins make a smaller package so are always easier to find.

THE FUN STUFF: ART, MIRRORS & **ACCESSORIES**

Be sure to allocate some funds in your budget to decorate the walls, especially if you decide to supply just the basics in furniture. You will have the advantage of being able to add something dramatic, and that will make your rental property stand out from the rest.



Rule #1 Select art you love. Buy a few pieces to start and try them in different rooms and areas. Once you know where they will work best, you can add more as necessary. If your furniture is more neutral toned, you can go to town on art and accessories to bring the space alive. Choose large art pieces for the living



There is no need to have lots of bits of home accessories everywhere. Make it look finished, but not cluttered. Select accessories that are more sturdy than glass or ceramic and not as easily broken. Ideally they will be not too expensive or difficult to replace either. Inexpensive throw pillows are handy for a touch of colour here and there, and you always have the option of adding a new pillow cover later, if you need to hide a stain or damage.


Rule #2 Less is more. A few carefully placed and well chosen items can bring a room together beautifully.

Nestled idyllically on some 682 plus hectares of the mid-Pacific coast of Costa Rica, Manuel Antonio National Park (named after a conquistador that is buried there) is one of the most visited tourist destinations of all of the country's 34 National Park and Reserve Systems. Second only to the Poas volcano in admissions, 366,000 visitors in 2022 traversed the park trails and enjoyed the pristine, white-sand beaches that slope down from tropical forest into the clear azure waters of the Pacific Ocean. The park habitat consists of primary and secondary forest, marsh and littoral woodland, an 18-hectare mangrove swamp and 12 islands off of the coast. Over 100 species of mammal and close to 200 species of bird have been identified in the park. It is home to the endangered Mono Titi (Saimiri oerstedii) monkey, as well as white-faced capuchin monkeys, howler monkeys, two and three-toed sloths, white-nosed coati, iguanas, and many other species of exotic wildlife. Pacific green turtles and olive ridley turtles occasionally nest on the beach. In addition to its diverse, paradisiacal flora and fauna, the park also has several other interesting features: The blowhole at Escondido Harbor that is best viewed as the tide surges in. Serrucho Point, an eroded cliff that looks like a saw and is honevcombed with sea caves, and a pre-Columbian, underwater turtle trap located on the western tip of Manuel Antonio Beach.

Open from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Closed on Tuesdays. Park admission is \$18.00 for adults & \$6.00 children 2-11. Entrance tickets can only be purchased online at serviciosenlinea.sinac.go.cr, and your passport number is required for registry at the national park. There are discounts for students and senior citizens. Sodas and waters are permitted, non alcoholic drinks, but at the moment, any type of food is not allowed. Guided tours are available and recommended. For park information 2777-5185, manuelantoniopark.com.

CONVENIENCE

Equip the kitchen with renters in mind. They are going to eat out much of the time, but they will also want to be able to prepare meals at the house too, especially if they have kids. Have all the basic equipment, food prep and cooking utensils, cutlery, dishes and pans, as well as beverage glasses. Supplying sets of unbreakable pool and patio plates and glasses is highly recommended too.

Have some puzzles, books, board games, movies, and copies of local magazines available. Other ideas to add to your renter's positive experience would be to compile a binder containing brochures on local attractions, tours and restaurants—with your recommendations on where to find the best Pizza or Chinese food! Tell them about the community markets and where and when they operate, where the banks, pharmacies, supermarkets, and libraries are, as well as your favourite beaches and waterfalls. Advise them too about the national holidays, when the banks will be closed, and which days are recycling and garbage pick-up.

Providing a "how to" instruction list or book about the house with your property manager's information will help them settle in guickly and add to their overall enjoyment. Especially if you have Spanish instructions on the microwave! Tell them about any guirks, and any special 'personality' your house may have!

Give them the security and internet codes, and let them know where you keep the remote and DVD's or CD's, and how to operate the equipment. Tell them that you provide some basic cleaning supplies in the laundry room, as well as cloths, (so they are not tempted to use your facecloths for cleaning off their sandals!), and they can hopefully deal with accidents as they happen, not wait for the cleaners to come.

There are many other considerations to deal with when renting your house, and furnishing and setting it up is just step one.

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






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
