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
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

Brisa Elegante was built in 2010 by the Fethiye Shipyard in Turkey. She is a Gulet, a type of sail cruiser known for its spacious and robust design. Shipbuilding in the south of Turkey has a long tradition. More than 2000 years ago, even the Phoenicians had their ships built in this region.

Gulet became popular in the 1930s in the Eastern Mediterranean, with growing popularity during the following decades. Today, Gulets are popular for day cruises and week charters in the Med, especially in Turkey, Greece, and Croatia.

But Brisa Elegante is special! Her hull is built from solid 3-inch mahogany planks, giving her a unique look and strength. She boasts a spacious foredeck, providing room for functions, weddings, and parties, and for your family and friends to enjoy a cruise on the Pacific Ocean.

Why does Brisa Elegante look like a pirate ship?

She is built in a very traditional way—like sailships have been designed for centuries. In the days of the Buccaneers, pirate ships were about the same size as Brisa Elegante. So, by boarding her, you will get the very feeling that generations of sailors had during the past 500 years!





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Lifeguard Letter 2025

Dear Costa Ballena community,

This has been a challenging year for our program, but with the help of some new energetic volunteers and board members that have been with us for over 20 years we have not only survived but have laid out a pathway to a future with more Lifeguards.



Our program would not have stayed afloat without the help of our community members, both individuals and businesses. We have had some very successful and very fun fundraisers in 2024 including the Eco Beer Fest at Fuego Brewery, the Semana Santa Classic surf contest, the Fourth of July River Float and Party, and a private dinner hosted by El Cocodrilo restaurant in Villa Rio Mar.

We have also been blessed for the last three years with a \$30,000 grant from the Five Together Foundation. The first year we used it to reconstruct the Lifeguard tower in Playa Hermosa, but for the last two years we needed those funds in order to pay the salaries for the four lifeguards that we have fully employed and our one part-time guard.

The shortfall in funding is because from 2019 to 2023 we Lifeguard Program for the local youth. Both groups were funded by the municipality. They gave us \$67,000 will receive first aid and CPR training, plus participate each year to cover the salaries of the Lifeguards and in beach activities relating to ocean rescues. our administrator. Unfortunately they stopped funding in 2024 and in 2025 they have yet to award a contract, I dream of a future where there are lifeguards on even though they have the money in their budget to pay the beaches from Parrita to Playa Tortuga, a network for a lifeguard program. This is shameful since because of volunteers that support them, and a business of the shortfall in funds there have been drownings community that funds them. It is up to us now to at Playa Hermosa and at Playa Dominical, both when make this dream come true. lifeguards were not on duty. We cannot let this continue. lifeguardscostaballena.com/donate We need to push the municipality to award a contract and pay to protect their citizens and the tourists that support the local economy.

Until the contract is awarded we are relying solely on funding from the community. Both large hotels and private individuals have sent us checks, made bank transfers, donated hotel stays and meals to our instructors, and also volunteered their time. They know that this program is vital for our beaches. We need to continue funding these efforts not just through fundraisers, but through our Dollar a Day program created by Richard Abraham, one of our biggest supporters over the lifetime of the program. He would say - "If you can buy a cup of coffee a day, then you can support our lifeguards."

Right now we have only 30 businesses signed up and there are over 1000 businesses in the area. If only a fraction of them would donate to the Dollar a Day program we could fund the entire program without the help of the government.

We know the future of our lifeguard program rests in the youth of the Costa Ballena community. Kids that grow up swimming and surfing on these beaches learn to understand the powerful currents and where it can be dangerous to go into the ocean. They will have the experience to guide beachgoers to safe areas of the beach and could reach rescue victims the quickest.



We want to hire an additional member of our team that will not only be the lifeguard captain, but can also provide training and instructions for potential lifeguards. They will help create a volunteer lifeguard program so that on busy weekends we can have volunteers walking the beach informing swimmers of dangerous rip currents. There will also be a Junior



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
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Tortillas, roti, wraps-whatever you want to call them, you can make these delights out of just about anything. Focus your nutritional intake by making a wrap out of whatever is it that you would like to eat more of at the moment.

If higher protein is your goal, you may want to make wraps from legumes, as in lentils, garbanzos, or even beans. You can use flour if you can find it, blend cooked beans, or soak raw lentils in an equal part water for a couple of hours before blending well and pouring into a hot pan. When you're looking to cut down on the carbs, this is an excellent option. You'll want to eat them freshly made, and you may want to load them with spices or herbs before cooking. Curry powder and turmeric seem to work well with these ingredients, along with perhaps a bit of nutritional yeast. Don't forget the salt! The pan should be hot before pouring in the batter, and have either a solid non-stick surface or light oiling. Spread the batter thin. Be patient.

If you're looking for a smoother consistency and prefer to wrap up with a grain, you can make a tortilla wrap from just about any of them. If the grain softens with soaking, such as oats or farro, you can just wait until the grain absorbs the water before blending and pouring into a hot pan. Other grains will need to be cooked first, such as rice and quinoa, unless you're using flours from these grains. Flavoring with rosemary can add a lovely nuance to your wraps; just be sure to break the herb into small pieces.

Naturally, it's also fine to blend a mix into your wraps. Chickpea-whole wheat? Red bean-brown rice? Chickpea-lentil-quinoa? Use vegetable juice in place of the water for a super power-packed wrap.

The next decision is how to eat them! You can pile some yumminess into the middle and wrap it up like a burrito, use as a side accompaniment for a delicious meal of soup or perhaps scooping up dal, or enjoy them in their own right as chips.

Your chips can be oil-fried, air-fried, toasted, or baked. If you're going the chip route, think about how you will eat them. If you plan to eat them by themselves, consider the flavoring situation. You may want to sprinkle with some onion or garlic powder, or even cinnamon and sugar for that sweet-tooth satisfaction. Chips are of course also great for scooping, though you'll find some ingredients hold up better than others with it comes to dipping the chips into toppings.



Because most are made from corn or wheat, wrap shells are typically a carbohydrate serving. No doubt, this is all we can find in the stores because shells made from the other kinds of ingredients simply do not have a reasonable shelf life. But we can eschew these carb servings and turn them into protein servings, and target our own nutrient intake, by making our own wraps at home from our own selected ingredients.

This is an excellent way to take more control of your diet. And for a lot of people, the legume-based tortillas feel like a bread serving, so they're getting fewer carbs with the same tongue satisfaction. It's easier than you think!







What a week we all had during this year's PELAGIC ROCKSTAR TOURNAMENT which took place over the weekend of January 9-12 here at the Marina Pez Vela. The energy, live music and dock socials were just electric, and the fishing and tournament results were nothing short of record breaking.

107 boats and 606 Anglers took part in the largest tournament in the history in Central America with \$2.3m prize money on the line. Teams released 2325 Sailfish and 100 Marlin, whilst 20 Tuna and 11 Dorado were brought to the scales.



TEAM GAME PLAN took top honours in the tournament in the SONAR BILLFISH DIVISION catching 5 Blue Marlin and 63 Sailfish over the 2 days winning them US\$1,16m to secure the largest tournament payout in history in Central America! Huge congrats guys and well deserved.

Team WAR PARTY took 2nd place with 4 Blue Marlin and 58 Sailfish, followed by MAMA SEATA in 3rd with 2 Blue Marlin and 60 Sailfish.

No one works harder on the dock than TEAM KELLY DAWN who took a totally deserved win in the NON-SONAR BILLFISH division with 44 Sailfish and 1 Marlin. Together with their day 1 winning Dorado TEAM KELLY DAWN walked away with the second largest cheque of the weekend, \$341,050, just wow guys, huge congrats!



Team SALTY CANUCKS aboard GOOD DAY caught the largest TUNA in the tournament's 9-year history, a stunning Tuna of 171lbs which helped them secure the Top Tuna prize and \$107,060.

Team FIRE FLY took top honours in the DORADO DIVISION with a combined weight of 58lbs, the only team in the tournament to catch Dorado on both fishing days scooping them \$121,460 in prize money.

We started the new year off with a bang as in January we witnessed some of the best billfishing anywhere in the world. An epic Sailfish bite welcomed in the new year as the Charter and Private fleets out of Quepos and Los Suenos recorded some truly mouthwatering

catch numbers. Many boats pushed their daily release Snapper, Tripletail, Jacks and Mackerel should be records to the limit catching large numbers of Sailfish. abundant along the beaches. TEAM PELAGIC released an estimated 600-700lbs Marlin. GYPSY GIRL released a 400lb Blue a host of different Snapper species in our area such as Marlin with their Anglers from North Carolina. GOOD Cubera, Red, Yellowtail, Rock, Mullet, and Spotted Rose DAY released a 400-500lb Marin and lost a similar one Snapper. Amberjacks, Pompano, Grouper and more in the same few days. can also be targeted out in the deeper water at the Offshore Reefs.

There have been some big Black Marlin over the Offshore Reefs, you can target these with Bonito Livebaits and there have been a few striped Marlin mixed in also out deep whilst Sailfishing.

There were a few Dorado showing early January but then they slowed up as the month progressed. Ocean currents and temperature seem to have diverted the Dorados from their usual migration pattern this year so we are not catching the numbers that we usually would, but you still have a chance of catching one whenever you have bait in the water during an Offshore trip. February to April usually provides the best opportunity of the year at catching a true trophy sized Bull Dorado in excess of 40lbs.

There have been some huge TUNA caught this year during December and January with many fish over 100lbs reported. That should continue during February and we would expect the Tuna schools to increase and move in closer during this next month or two as they usually do this time of year. Last year we experienced some of the best, most consistent Tuna fishing we have ever seen and we are hoping for a repeat this year.

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Discover the Importance of Leaf Cutting for Sloth Rehabilitation at The Sloth Institute!



Leaf cutting is one of the most important tasks we carry out here at The Sloth Institute. Every day, our team spends hours driving around the local area, searching for and cutting fresh leaves to bring back to our rehabilitation centre to feed our sloths. Sloths are habitual leaf eaters, and since they consume

a significant amount daily, providing the right leaves is critical to their care and recovery.



Fresh, tender leaves are essential because sloths are extremely picky eaters. They will only eat the young, soft 'baby' leaves - those that are newly grown and juicy! These are the parts sloths naturally seek out in the wild, and if we don't provide them with the right leaves, they won't eat. It's a precise process, we can't just cut any old leaves, or our sloths will refuse our offerings.

Over the years, we've spent extensive time observing sloths in the wild, learning that they consume a variety of leaves from different tree species. Their leaf diet is surprisingly diverse, and the two species of sloth that are found in Costa Rica have distinct leaf preferences. To ensure they receive the proper nutrition, we tailor our leaf collection to match the species we are rehabilitating at any given time. We collect sacks of leaves from a variety of trees, ensuring that each species gets the specific types they prefer. Offering them a varied diet isn't just about meeting their immediate needs, it's also about preparing them for life in the wild. When our sloths are eventually released, they'll need to forage for a wide range of leaves in their natural habitat. By providing them with a selection of leaves during rehabilitation, we're helping them regain the skills and instincts necessary to thrive once they return to the wild.



Our leaf-hunting journeys take us far and wide, from Manuel Antonio to Dominical and even as far as Jaco. Whether it's beaches, edges of football or palm fields, or even a random tree spotted along the roadside, no place is off-limits when it comes to finding the highest quality leaves! However, as we enter the dry season in Costa Rica, sourcing fresh leaves becomes increasingly difficult. The lack of rain causes many trees to stop producing new growth, resulting in a shortage of fresh leaves. While this challenge affects us, it's even harder for the sloths. They don't have access to vehicles to search far and wide, nor can they reach the isolated spots we can! These inaccessible areas are often a result of urbanisation, which forces sloths to search for food in an increasingly developed world. Deforestation continues to shrink the habitats of Costa Rica's wildlife, leaving sloths with fewer places entirely to forage for the food they depend on.



This is one of the reasons we launched our tree nursery a year ago: to help replenish the diminishing food sources for our sloths and other wildlife. Last year, we planted 935 trees, and this year, we aim to plant even more! If you know of any land that could benefit from reforestation, please contact us at pedro@theslothinstitute.com. Cheesy Veggie Lasagna

Even the hardcore carnivores will approve.

For 8 to 10 portions using a 9 X 13 inch rectangular pan

- 3 tablespoons of olive oil
- 3 large carrots
- 1 large onion
- 5 whole garlic cloves
- 1 red bell pepper
- 1 large zucchini
- 1 bunch of spinach leaves
- 1 bunch of basil leaves, more for garnish
- 2 cups of prepared marinara sauce*
- 2 cups of ricotta or cottage cheese
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 1 box of ready-to-use lasagna noodles
- 2 cups of good quality shredded mozzarella cheese





Directions

- 1. Roughly chop the vegetables and saute in olive oil until nicely caramelized. This should take 10 to 15 minutes.
- 2. Season with salt and pepper and lightly pulse in the food processor.
- 3. Mix with ricotta cheese.
- 4. Begin the layers in this order: 1/2 cup of marinara sauce, then noodles, then half of the veggie mixture, then 3/4 cup of tomato sauce, then 1/2 cup of mozzarella, then noodles, then remaining veggie mixture, then 1/2 cup of mozzarella, then noodles, then remaining sauce, then remaining cheese.
- 5. Cover with foil or parchment paper trying to not touch the cheese and bake at 400 degrees Fahrenheit for 10 minutes.
- 6. Remove the cover and finish baking for another 15 minutes until the top is brown and bubbly.

*You can make a quick 10 minute marinara sauce by cooking down some tomato passata with chopped garlic, salt and pepper.

Life and Death are a Perpetual Cycle with no Beginning or End

Life has become an integral part of the water cycle as well. Plants take up water molecules and carbon dioxide and combine them, in the Sun-driven process of photosynthesis, to manufacture roots, stems, leaves, and fruit. And when those nutrient rich plant tissues are eaten by animals and broken down by the metabolic miracle of respiration, the waste products, exhaled with every breath we take, are reassembled molecules of carbon dioxide and water. Robert M. Hanzen, The Story of Earth - P 91

Yin and yang is a concept of dualism describing how seemingly opposite or contrary forces – life and death, love and hate, light and dark, female and male, sky and earth – may be complementary, interconnected, and



interdependent in the natural world. The concept is a perfect example of nature. When you walk through a tropical forest the amount and diversity of life of all kinds is overwhelming. But if you pay attention to the surroundings, you will find death everywhere, rotting logs on the ground, fallen branches and seeds in a state of decomposition, leaf litter all over the forest floor, perhaps the putrid smell of a decomposing animal body not yet consumed by scavengers. The dead matter is being consumed by innumerable living beings: insects, bacteria, fungi, mold, invertebrates, and the occasional bird or mammal. Everything now living in the forest will eventually die and become food for other living things that will eat, assimilate and break down into the basic building blocks of life, and the cycle goes on. Creation followed by destruction and back to creation, inseparable opposites melded together until they appear as one. Yin and yang.

One morning while walking through the rainforest I was astounded at a sight that met my eyes. I stood and stared at a clearing, half the size of a football field, that had replaced an old iguano tree and much of the surrounding jungle. The trunk was on the ground. My companion Pedro and I chopped our way through a tangle of branches and vines to get to the trunk which had broken at ground level. The entire circumference of the base was visible. I estimated that the diameter was about three meters, the height of an NBA basketball hoop.



A long narrow fissure, not wide enough for a person to crawl through, penetrated deep into the trunk inviting all sorts of small living beings to crawl inside and explore or take refuge. Watching an oval-shaped scarab beetle with large powerful pincers crawl into the dark crevice, I pondered what was happening. Black ants were exploring every little nook and cranny. These were some of the first arrivals to consume the windfall of decaying vegetable matter. More and different organisms would arrive to claim their share of the fallen giant. Eventually, the entire tree would be eaten, broken down into its basic elements, and recycled back into the ecosystem from which it came. The old tree had begun assembling the building blocks that laid before me, as much as three centuries ago.

Life and death are a continuous cycle, and it would be incorrect to define a starting point, but let's begin the story when the old iguano was a seed in a clearing like the one that surrounded us.



Sunlight poured into the open space warming the moist soil, and the seed germinated, sprouted, and grew as fast as it could, perhaps reaching the height of a tall person, before the larger, taller plants, all fighting for as many of the life-giving rays as they could capture, closed the gap. Now only a fraction of the sunlight falling on the forest canopy filtered down through layer after layer finally reaching the small iguano tree. Photosynthesis dwindled to the point that the young tree entered a semi-dormant state, alive and healthy but with little growth. Years separated the bursts of sunlight, large and small, brought about by nearby tree falls, or perhaps the breaking of a large branch from a neighboring tree. With each such occurrence, the iguano tree utilized the sun's energy and sprinted upward until again the upper levels of the forest closed out the light. It slowly struggled through layer after layer of leafy branches each step bringing it a slightly larger share of the energy-laden rays. Until one day, after a neighboring tree fell to the ground and opened a huge hole in the canopy, our iguano reached its goal and took its place in the direct sunlight among the crowns of other rainforest giants.

After having struggled for one hundred years, or much more, to earn its place among the titans of the rainforest the struggle continued. The crown of the iguano competed and battled with other trees and expanded to fill as much of the open space as it could until the tops of the nearby behemoths closed in around it. The leafy crest now captured a tremendous amount of the sun's energy, which it combined with water and nutrients drawn from the soil to fuel the creation of wood fiber, roots, flowers, fruit, seeds, and leaves. The tree became a haven for other forms of life. Huge bromeliads adorned the limbs and thick lianas dangled down through the foliage below. Every crevice and hollow in the trunk and branches held more lifeforms as did the numerous hiding places within the bodies of the leafy plants hanging on every arm. The curved leaves of a bromeliad captured rain and channeled it to a holding chamber at the base, where small amphibians and reptiles, along with insects of all kinds, found refuge, especially during

the time of year when rain was scarce. Birds used the iguano's limbs and trunk for resting and nesting. Squirrels scampered back and forth, sloths slept, and monkeys played. Another 100 years or more may have passed with the tree thickening its trunk and branches, deepening and expanding its root system, and strengthening its fibers. Still, one day it reached a point where the new tissue being created by the wonder of photosynthesis was not equal to the loss of old tissue through the counter forces that wear away at every living being, and visible deterioration began. The first step may have been a small branch breaking off from a larger one, leaving exposed inner tissue which in a younger tree would have simply closed over to form a scar. But our old giant was losing its resistance, and its defenses were weakening. The wound remained open allowing fungi, mold, burrowing insects, and decomposition bacteria to penetrate and prevent it from sealing. These slowly ate away at the major branch, to which the fallen limb had been attached, until one day, with a resounding "kraaak", it broke, but not completely. The huge branch remained partially attached for a month or two until the weight of all that wood dangling in the breeze ripped away bark and fiber, and it went crashing through vines and lower branches to the forest floor, damaging a superficial root when it landed. Now there were two substantial wounds, one on the trunk where the large branch broke and one on the root where it landed. All the living beings that fed on the dying tree now had two major openings to the inner tissues. The process could have gone on for years, the rainforest giant plunging to the ground piece by piece, or it could have ended in one violent thunderstorm whipping the crown and twisting the trunk until its old, tired wood could no longer withstand the force. One way or another all of those tons of once strong fiber eventually gave way, allowing our old iguano to topple. On its way to the ground, it crashed against neighboring upper canopy trees, taking them with it and dragging others with a tangle of branches, vines, and lianas. An enormous amount of vegetation from the lower layers of the canopy was taken down with the falling mass to the forest floor. This brought to an end the life of a truly magnificent living being, our rainforest giant, but the cycle continued as energy-laden sunlight again reached the ground and stimulated the growth of other plants that would eventually fill the gap. And around and around the cycle persists.

Jack Ewing was born and educated in Colorado. In 1970 he and his wife Diane moved to the jungles of Costa Rica where they raised two children, Natalie and Chris. A newfound fascination with the rainforest was responsible for his transformation from cattle rancher into environmentalist and naturalist. 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


Conserve Water

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A Bird's Eye View Great Kiskadee

The adult Great Kiskadee (*Pitangus sulphuratus*) is one of the largest of the tyrant flycatchers. It is 25 to 28 cm (9.8 to 11.0 in) in length and weighs 53 to 71.5 g (1.87 to 2.52 oz). The head is black with a strong white supercilium and a concealed yellow crown stripe. The upperparts are brown, and the wings and tail are brown with usually strong rufous fringes. The bill is short, thick, and black in color. The similar boat-billed flycatcher has a more massive black bill, an olive-brown back, and very little rufous in the tail and wings. A few other tyrant flycatchers — the social flycatcher for example — share a similar color pattern, but these species are markedly smaller.



The call is an exuberant BEE-tee-WEE, and the bird has an onomatopoeic name in different languages and countries: In Brazil its popular name is bem-te-vi ("I saw you well") and in Spanish-speaking countries it is often bien-te-veo ("I see you well") and sometimes shortened to benteveo.





The Great Kiskadee is a common, noisy, and conspicuous bird. It is almost omnivorous and hunts like a shrike or flycatcher, waiting on an open perch high in a tree to sally out and catch insects in flight or to pounce upon rodents and similar small vertebrates. It will also take prey (such as small snakes, lizards, frogs, perched insects, spiders, millipedes and land snails) and occasionally dives for freshwater snails, fish or tadpoles in shallow water, making it one of the few fishing passerines. It also visits feeding stations to eat bread, dog food, bananas and peanut butter/seed mixture. Kiskadees like to hunt on their own or in pairs, and though they might be expected to make good use of prey flushed too large for the smaller birds of the understory, they do not seem to join mixed-species feeding flocks very often. When they do, they hunt in the familiar manner. Such opportunistic feeding behavior makes it one of the most common birds in urban areas around Latin America; its flashy belly and its shrill call make it one of the most conspicuous.



Great kiskadees are monogamous and defend a territory. Both sexes build a large domed nest that has a side entrance. It is chiefly composed of grasses and small twigs but can also incorporate lichen, string, and plastic. The birds will steal material from other nests. The nest is placed in a wide range of sites, often in an exposed position high up in a tree or on manmade structures. The clutch is 3 to 4 eggs. These are moderately glossy, light yellowish cream in colour with purplish black and purplish brown spots. Only the female incubates the eggs; the male guards the nest while she leaves the nest to feed. The eggs hatch after 16–17 days. The chicks are fed by both parents and fledge after 17–18 days.

Please do not feed or interact with the wildlife... it is the law!

Did you know that Costa Rica has a great wealth of nature, with about 5% of the species worldwide concentrated in our small country? We have over 8,500 species of plants, 220 species of reptiles, 160 species of amphibians, 205 species of mammals, and 850 species birds. However, deforestation, poaching, the use of pesticides, illegal pet trade, and improper feeding have caused a decline in populations of many species to levels that threaten their survival.

You might find feeding and interacting with the wild animals to be a thrilling experience, but you are not doing the them a favor. In fact, you are actually harming them, and it is against the law (Conservation of Wildlife Act No. 7317 according to Decree No. 32633- MINAE). The only exception is a dire emergency where a species would perish without aid or food.




Here's why you should not feed our wildlife:

• Wildlife are highly susceptible to diseases from human hands. They can die from bacteria transferred off your hand that has no ill effect on you. They can pass diseases to you as well.

- Migration to human-populated areas to be fed increases the risk of dog attacks, road accidents, and electrocution
- Irregular feeding leads to an aggressive behavior toward humans and other species and creates a dangerous dependency on humans that diminishes the wildlife survival abilities.
- Contrary to the stereotype, bananas are not the preferred food of monkeys in the wild, nor other wildlife in the area. Tropical fruits, seeds, eggs, and insects found in the wild are what nature intended. Bananas, especially those containing pesticides, can upset their delicate digestive systems and cause serious dental problems that can lead to eventual death.
- Pregnant females who are fed nothing but bananas during their pregnancy will not give birth to healthy infants. The babies will be malnourished, or even die before birth.
- Feeding interferes with their natural habits and upsets the balance of their lifestyle.
- Contact with humans facilitates poaching and the trade in illegal wildlife.
- Wildlife needs to travel long distances each day to be in good physical condition. If they know that food is available in a particular location, they will not leave that area.

In addition, pursuing or getting close to animals for pictures or touching is very stressful to the animal. Sloths may look like they are always smiling, but close human contact causes them to become agitated, so keep your distance!

The wildlife does not realize any of this. Now **YOU DO**, so you are no longer naïve to the harm caused by feeding and interaction. Don't facilitate the extinction of nature's most amazing creatures for your own pleasure or financial gain.



What to do if you're caught in a Rip Current

DON'T PANIC! Swim Parallel to the shore until clear of the current. If you can't break free, let the current take you out beyond the breakers. Then swim diagonally toward the shore. Never try to swim against the current. Remember it's easier to float in salt water.





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
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




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


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
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
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
